


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# **11<sup>TH</sup> SEPTEMBER 2022 TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**



# 'ALL I HAVE IS YOURS ...'

We hear three parables today, linked together in response to the complaint that Jesus 'welcomes sinners and eats with them'. As we hear them each in turn, notice how they become progressively more intimate, even urgent. Losing one sheep from a hundred doesn't seem too bad. Most shepherds would probably just move on. Losing one coin from the ten is more of a hit, but still, would you turn the house over or just wait for it to show up? But losing one of only two sons... even the most hardened father would feel that loss deeply. Hearing the three parables in a row therefore gives us a unique perspective that we might miss if we only hear them in isolation. The deep pain that is felt in losing the 'one of two sons', God also feels that for the loss of even 'one of a hundred sheep.' And the same seemingly reckless abandon he is ready to show in seeking out that one sheep, he is also ready to show in pursuing that one son. Numbers are of no concern to our Heavenly Father. He never loses sight of any of his children, but is ready to give up everything, even his only Son, for the sake of the one who is lost....

The final parable of course has the extra twist; we don't just stand on the outside as an observer, but are invited into the parable as a participant. Which of the two sons do we identify with more? Perhaps we can even see a bit of ourselves in both? I think this would be the most honest ans wer. We have all sinned, and so should take courage from the story of the merciful Father's joy in welcoming his younger son back home. He will never turn as away, no matter how far we have strayed or how long we have been away. He seeks us with all his heart. But we can also see a bit of ourselves in the older son too. It is easy to be caught up in feelings of frustration and resentment. We have been slaving hard, bearing the brunt of the load without rest. What about us? Surely we 'deserve' some reward for that? It is no point hiding such feelings. If we are struggling with them, share them with the Father. He won't turn us away. He will hear us out and then reply... "My son, you are with me always and all I have is yours." In other words, what greater reward could we ask for? He shares all he has with us, his very life. We receive his Son as pure gift, his Spirit stirs in our hearts. All God has is ours! There is no greater treasure that we could seek, and we couldn't even begin to 'earn' it if we tried! Enter his house and enjoy the richness of his bounty.

so he hired himself out to one of the local inhabitants who put him on his farm to feed the pigs. And he would willingly have filled his belly with the husks the pigs were eating but no one offered him anything. Then he came to his senses and said, "How many of my father's paid servants have more food than they want, and here am I dying of hunger! I will leave this place and go to my father and say: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as one of your paid servants." So he left the place and went back to his father.

'While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity. He ran to the boy, clasped him in his arms and kissed him tenderly. Then his son said, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son." But the father said to his servants, "Quick! Bring out the best robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the calf we have been fattening, and kill it; we are going to have a feast, a celebration, because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found." And they began to celebrate.

'Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his way back, as he drew near the house, he could hear music and dancing. Calling one of the servants he asked what it was all about. "Your brother has come" replied the servant, "and your father has killed the calf we had fattened because he has got him back safe and sound." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But, for this son of yours, when he comes back after swallowing up your property – he and his women – you kill the calf we had been fattening."

#### FIRST READING Ex 32:7-11. 13-14

A reading from the book of Exodus

The Lord relented and did not send the evil he had threatened.

The Lord spoke to Moses, 'Go down now, because your people whom you brought out of Egypt have apostatised. They have been quick to leave the way I marked out for them; they have made themselves a calf of molten metal and have worshipped it and offered it sacrifice. #### GOSPEL Lk 15:1-32

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke There will be joy in heaven over one sinner who does penance.

The tax collectors and the sinners were all seeking the company of Jesus to hear what he had to say, and the Pharisees and the scribes complained. 'This man' they said 'welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he spoke this parable to them:

'What man among you with a hundred sheep, losing one, would not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the missing one till he found it? And when he found it, would he not joyfully take it on his shoulders and then, when he got home, call together his friends and neighbours? "Rejoice with me," he would say "I have found my sheep that was lost." In the same way, I tell you, there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one repentant sinner than over ninety-nine virtuous men who have no need of repentance.

'Or again, what woman with ten drachmas would not, if she lost one, light a lamp and sweep out the house and search thoroughly till she found it? And then, when she had found it, call together her friends and neighbours? "Rejoice with me," she would say "I have found the drachma I lost." In the same way, I tell you, there is rejoicing among the angels of God over one repentant sinner.'

He also said, 'A man had two sons. The younger said to his father, "Father, let me have the share of the estate that would come to me." So the father divided the property between them. A few days later, the younger son got together everything he had and left for a distant country where he squandered his money on a life of debauchery. 'When he had spent it all, that country experienced a severe famine, and now he began to feel the pinch,

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
