RECEIVE THE LIGHT OF CHRIST! MAY IT BE KEPT BURNING BRIGHTLY! LET IT SHINE FOR ALL TO SEE!



At the beginning of the Easter Vigil, the congregation receive the light from the Paschal Candle and then process into the church with their little 'lamps' burning brightly. Remember the parable of the wise bridesmaids who were ready to meet the Bridegroom with their lamps full? All through Lent we have been like the bridesmaids. Through prayer, fasting and almsgiving we have been preparing our hearts to welcome Christ our Bridegroom once again. Let's now open them up to receive Him anew! May His light drive away all darkness and despair. May we be filled up once again by His love, His Peace and His joy! He is Risen! He is alive! Rise up to meet him!

With our lamps lit, we then come to a very special moment; the renewal of our Baptismal Vows. With everything else going on during these special ceremonies, this renewal can be very easy to miss. But really, it is at the very heart of the whole season. In our Baptism, we joined with Christ in his first Easter. We died to sin and were buried with him in the waters of baptism, so that we might rise with him to new and eternal life. Today, we relive that mystery. Today, we renew that grace. It is as if we were freshly baptised once again, ready to take the Light of Christ with us and to share it with all those we meet.

So let's receive that Light with joyful hearts! Stoke the flame and let it burn brightly in your lives! Today you are sent out. Christ has called and commissioned each and every one of you to take His Light with you as you go. Take it into your homes and workplaces. Share it with your families, your friends and your neighbours. You have been filled up anew with the joy, peace and love of Christ. Wherever you bring that joy, wherever you take that peace, wherever you live that love; you are sharing the Light of Christ. You are able to take His Light to places that no-one else can. You are able to share it in ways that are unique to you. You have a special role to play, a one-off vocation to live out. Christ is with you. His life is in you. May His Light forever burn brightly in your hearts, and may it shine out for all to see.

Divine Mercy Sunday – Sunday 16th April

The Sunday after Easter is observed as a special celebration of Divine Mercy. To commemorate this great feast, we will pray together as Parish Community the Divine Mercy Chaplet after our weekend Masses. For those who would like to join, an additional, special observance for Divine Mercy Sunday will be held from 2pm - 3.30pm.

The schedule is as follows:

- 2pm 3pm Adoration with Reconciliation available (Including Rosary at 2.30pm)
- 3pm Divine Mercy Chaplet in Song with Benediction to finish
- Drinks and nibbles to follow (anything you can bring to share will be greatly appreciated!)

Divine Mercy Sunday falls on the Second Sunday of Easter. What's so great about Divine Mercy Sunday? Well, look at it this way: What's the most important feast day of the year? Easter, right? And how many days is Easter? We celebrate it for eight full days, which is why we call it the Octave of Easter. But the last day is the greatest of all. The eighth day. It's the climax of the whole feast. Well, Divine Mercy Sunday is the eighth day of Easter, the climax of the entire Easter celebration. In a sense, it's the most important day of the most important feast!

Divine Mercy Sunday existed way before St. Faustina. In fact, it has its roots in the Easter celebrations of the early Church. When Jesus told Faustina that He wanted the feast celebrated, she asked some priests and theologians about it, and they told her, "There already is such a feast." So, Faustina went back to Jesus and told Him, "They tell me that there already is such a feast, and so why should I talk about it?" Jesus responded, "And who knows anything about this feast? No one!" (Diary of St. Faustina, 341). In other words, the great feast of mercy had been forgotten and was almost completely unknown. So, you can imagine Jesus saying to Faustina, "Look, I want people to know and celebrate this feast. And to sweeten the deal, I promise to give great graces on Divine Mercy Sunday." Specifically, he told her: "On that day [Divine Mercy Sunday], the very,

depths of My tender mercy are opened. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. ... On that day, all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened. (Diary of St. Faustina, 699)"

Thousands upon thousands of people attest to the superpower of prayer offered on Divine Mercy Sunday. But we still haven't gotten to our favourite part of Divine Mercy Sunday, what we call "the clean slate grace." Regarding Divine Mercy Sunday, Jesus told St. Faustina, "The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins punishment" (699). Now, that's a big deal. It means that if we were to die right after receiving this grace, then we wouldn't have to go to purgatory! In other words, our slate is wiped clean. In fact, the theologian who was assigned by the future Pope John Paul II to investigate the question "What is the grace of Mercy Sunday?" likened the grace to a second baptism. Of course, it's not the same as Baptism, but it is an extraordinary grace of being cleansed of sin and the punishment due to sin.

Unfortunately, a lot of people confuse the great grace of Divine Mercy Sunday with a plenary indulgence. It's not the same thing. To get a plenary indulgence, you need to do the indulgenced act, pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, go to confession (within 20 days), receive Holy Communion, and be detached from all sin. That last one is the kicker. Are we detached from all sin? Saint Philip Neri was speaking to a large crowd of people who had gathered for some Church event to receive a plenary indulgence, and the Holy Spirit told St. Philip that only two people in the whole crowd were going to receive the plenary indulgence: Philip himself and a seven-year-old boy – presumably because everyone else was attached to sin.

Now, the good news about the grace of Divine Mercy Sunday is that to receive it, you simply need to go to confession before or on the feast – the experts say that sometime during Lent suffices – be in the state of grace (no mortal sin), and receive Holy Communion with the intention of obtaining the promised grace. Of course, we should also do acts of mercy such as forgiving people, praying for others, and having the intention to be more merciful to our neighbour.

SCRIPTURE READINGS FOR EASTER SUNDAY

The Readings for the Easter Vigil are special to the night Mass. The Psalms will be on the slides.

FIRST READING Acts 10:34. 37-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead – and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Ps 117:1-2. 16-17. 22-23. R. v.24

(R.) This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.

Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, for his love has no end. Let the sons of Israel say: 'His love has no end.'

The Lord's right hand has triumphed; his right hand raised me up. I shall not die, I shall live and recount his deeds.

The stone which the builders rejected has become the corner stone. This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians Look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is.

Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in

God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life

you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION 1 Cor 5:7-8

Alleluia, alleluia! Christ has become our paschal sacrifice; let us feast with joy in the Lord. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Mt 28:1-10

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

He has risen from the dead and now he is going before you to Galilee.

After the Sabbath, and towards dawn on the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala and the other Mary went to visit the sepulchre. And all at once there was a violent earthquake, for the angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled away the stone and sat on it. His face was like lightning, his robe white as snow. The guards were so shaken, so frightened of him, that they were like dead men. But the angel spoke; and he said to the women, 'There is no need for you to be afraid. I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here, for he has risen, as he said he would. Come and see the place where he lay, then go quickly and tell his disciples, "He has risen from the dead and now he is going before you to Galilee; it is there you will see him." Now I have told you.' Filled with awe and great joy the women came quickly away from the tomb and ran to tell the disciples.
