RECEIVE THE LIGHT OF CHRIST!

We have six children being baptised this weekend in our Parish, which is very special. After being baptised with water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, the Rite is completed with four extra signs. They will be anointed with the perfumed Oil of Chrism, clothed in a white garment, blessed over their ears and lips, and entrusted with the Light of Christ from the Easter Candle. I always love the candle bit, and the children always do too! Even if they have protested the water and thrown off the stole, they always



love the candle! Their godparents will hold it for them for the timebeing (safety first!), but that little flame is a symbol of the gift of faith that is been given to them. Their parents and godparents will have a special role in nurturing that faith, but eventually the children will be called to take on the light of Christ for themselves.

The words of the Rite say it so succintly and well. When we hand over the candle we pray;

Receive the light of Christ!
Parents and godparents, this light is entrusted to you to
be kept burning brightly.

These children of yours have been enlightened by Christ.

They are to walk always as children of the light.

May they keep the flame of faith alive in their hearts.

When the Lord comes, may they go out to meet him with all the saints in the heavenly kingdom.

Do you notice something about the prayer? It makes it very clear that the job isn't over yet. In fact the real task is just beginning. They are receiving the Light of Christ. This Light will always be there to guide them and push aside the darkness that can overcome us, but it has to be kept alive. It has to be fed in order to shine brightly. As the baptised, we are also tasked with the mission of sharing Christ's Light with everyone we meet.

But again, if our light isn't to be exhausted, it has to be refueled and fed. And it is good for us who were baptised a long time ago to hear these words again; because they remind us that this is a lifelong mission. Our work is far from complete. The journey begins for our little children today, but all of us should hear the same call; Keep the flame of faith alive in our hearts! That way, we will be ready to meet the Lord when he comes.

Now, little flames kept burning brightly, ready to meet the Lord when he comes... does that sound a little familiar? It is just like this Sunday's Gospel isn't it, and the parable of the ten bridesmaids. The five wise ones kept their lamps trimmed and their oil jars full, and so they we ready to meet the Bridegroom when he came. Both the Parable and the Baptism Rite then are reminding us of the same thing; be ready, keep the flame alive! And how do we do that? The answer is really very simple; through prayer, the Sacraments and through our everyday acts of love. Simple enough for even the smallest child!

HAVE YOU THOUGHT?

Why would Jesus have used a story about bridesmaids waiting for a groom?

Why wouldn't the wise bridesmaids give their spare oil to the others?

How do you think the bride might have reacted to the events of the story?

In what ways is this story a parable of the Kingdom of God?

What message comes out of this gospel for a modern audience?

How can we properly prepare for the coming of the Kingdom?

In what ways are some Christians today like the foolish bridesmaids?



SCRIPTURE REFLECTION BY NICK BRODIE

Reflecting on this Gospel passage, Pope Francis affirms that 'Jesus wants to tell us that we must be prepared for the encounter with him'. Jesus gives a pretty blunt message of preparedness, after all: 'stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour".

But the Pope reminds us that this readiness of which Jesus speaks is not meant to be just for 'the final encounter'. Jesus wants us to be ready, as the Pope puts it, 'for the everyday great and small encounters'. Jesus wants us to be prepared by being wakeful. That means being alert and active.

As Pope Francis further reminds us, the lamps symbolise faith and the oil symbolises charity. We might therefore ask ourselves whether and how we prepare our lamps of faith to shine? Do we see Jesus in the poor, the sick, the lonely, the forgotten peoples of this world, and act accordingly? Or do we sleepily wander through life fixated only on the final encounter, slowly letting the oil of charity run dry and the lamp of faith grow dim? © Nick Brodie

FIRST READING Wisdom 6:12-16 A reading from the book of Wisdom Wisdom is found by those who look for it.

Wisdom is bright, and does not grow dim.

By those who love her she is readily seen, and found by those who look for her. Quick to anticipate those who desire her, she makes herself known to them. Watch for her early and you will have no trouble; you will find her sitting at your gates. Even to think about her is understanding fully grown; be on the alert for her and anxiety will quickly leave you. She herself walks about looking for those who are worthy of her and graciously shows herself to them as they go, in every thought of theirs coming to meet them. The Word of the Lord. SECOND READING 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 From the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians: Those who died as Christians, God will bring to life with Jesus.

We want you to be quite certain, brothers, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with him. We can tell you this from the Lord's own teaching, that any of us who are left alive until the Lord's coming will not have any advantage over those who have died. At

the trumpet of God, the voice of the archangel will call out the command and the Lord himself will come down from heaven; those who have died in Christ will be the first to rise, and then those of us who are still alive will be taken up in the clouds, together with them, to meet the Lord in the air. So we shall stay with the Lord for ever. With such thoughts as these you should comfort one another.

Gospel Matthew 25:1-13

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew Look, the bridegroom comes. Go out to meet him.

Jesus told this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this: Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five of them were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late, and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry, "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said, "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.'
