GOD'S NEW FAMILY: THE CHURCH

So what is going on in today's Gospel? Why does it seem to take Jesus some convincing to reach out and help the Canaanite woman? Of course, we can't read Jesus' mind, but we can know the background and context. And that background is really key to understanding the whole Gospel story.

Jesus belonged to the house of Israel. This was God's Chosen People. Beginning with their father Abraham, he had called them out from darkness and patiently raised them up. Through Moses and the many prophets sent after him, God had taught Israel his ways and formed them to be his Holy Nation, his Royal and Priestly People, a people set apart to be his own. He formed a covenant with them, a special bond. He would be with his People to guide, nurture and protect them. And they, in their turn, would keep his commandments and worship him alone. Belonging to this Family was an

awesome privilege, but with the awesome privilege also came great responsibility. And Israel didn't always live up to that. Their history was one of stumbles and falls. Time and again they failed in their trust and turned to the false gods of their neighbours (like the Canaanites). Time and again God forgave them and lifted them up. Even when the went astray and were lost, God never forgot them. He searched for them and called them back. And slowly and patiently God worked on a new plan; not just to save this small family of Israel once again, but through them, to save the whole world.

With the coming of Jesus comes the fulfilment of this new plan. God is going to establish a new family, and a new People. This one will not be based on ties of blood and kinship. You won't have to be born into it. Rather, the door to this new family will be **faith**. The Canaanite woman shows great faith. And her great faith demonstrates that the time of this new family had finally arrived. We ourselves are now part of that same family of faith, that new family, because that new family of faith is the Church.

Why do you think Jesus first responded to the woman in the way he did?

What turned Jesus' attitude around?

What do you think the woman was thinking/feeling as she approached Jesus?

What message would the followers of Jesus have taken from this event?

What is the message of this Gospel passage for us today?

By inference, Jesus describes the Canaanites as 'dogs'. Who are the 'dogs' (the unworthy) in today's society?

What motivated this Canaanite woman to approach Jesus, a Jew?

In what ways have you ever turned to an unlikely source for help?

The woman risked herself on her daughter's behalf. Who would you risk your reputation for?

In what way/s does this story challenge you?

THOUGHTS ON THE GOSPEL READING

My dear friends you'd have to admire the tenacity of the woman in our Gospel. Being a Canaanite, that of a different culture and religion to Jesus, didn't stop her getting what she wanted. She got over any inhibitions she might have had in approaching Jesus and his disciples (her humility).

When first referring to Jesus as, "Sir, son of David" didn't solicit any response she called him "Lord". We can see her faith being drawn out as to who she believed Jesus was, just a man, "sir" or God and hence "Lord", someone who was able to heal her daughter. When he said to her he had come to the lost sheep of the House of Israel she persisted, that others can also have faith and share in God's blessing (achieving this with the help of her humour). The result is she acquired healing for her daughter.

My friends the woman in this Gospel story teaches us the importance of several values:

firstly, the essential requirement of perseverance and persistence:

secondly, the need for humility;thirdly, the value of humour; and fourthly, the necessity of faith.

Having an abundance of these four values in our lives are essential for good healthy and life-giving relationships at home, at work and with our God.

Let me tell you pagans this: I have been sent to the pagans as their apostle, and I am proud of being sent, but the purpose of it is to make my own people envious of you, and in this way save some of them. Since their rejection meant the reconciliation of the world, do you know what their admission will mean? Nothing less than a resurrection from the dead! God never takes back his gifts or revokes his choice.

Just as you changed from being disobedient to God, and now enjoy mercy because of their disobedience, so those who are disobedient now — and only because of the mercy shown to you — will also enjoy mercy eventually. God has imprisoned all men in their own disobedience only to show mercy to all mankind. The Word of the Lord. *ALL: Thanks be to God*

Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.
