YOU MUST LOVE THE LORD YOUR GOD WITH ALL YOUR HEART, AND WITH ALL YOUR SOUL, AND WITH ALL YOUR MIND... AND YOUR NEIGHBOUR AS YOURSELF...

Let's not complicate things. It's pretty simple, and simple in the truest sense of the word, simple in the way that we describe God as simple (does that surprise you?). We are called to love, and not just with a part of ourselves, but with everything we have and everything we are. That is how God loves. God is described as Simple, because God is not made up of lots of little bits and pieces. God is One. When he wills something, he wills it perfectly, without any division. When he loves, he loves with his whole self, holding nothing back.

Unlike God, we are made up of lots of parts. And sometimes those parts need to learn to act in union with each other. How often do we find ourselves saying; 'I want to do this good thing, but I just don't have the energy'. Or, thinking 'I clearly need to avoid this thing, because it will lead to hurt,' but then our heart confuses things with... 'maybe it isn't all that bad after all...?' We can experience real confusion, at times even division within ourselves, and that is a challenge we have to face.

There is a solid wisdom in the commandment to love with all your heart, soul and mind... it is a reminder that we need to work towards a pure and simple love that incorporates our whole self. True love for God incoorporates every fibre of our being and touches every aspect of our lives, especially our relationships with the person right next to us. Of course, we are changeable, and so living that kind of love is a work-in-progress. But the good news is, we are changeable, and so Christ can help bring that growth. He has shown us that it is possible to love with a pure and simple love. He shows us it is possible to give ourselves over entirely in love.

Our married couples are living that call in a special way, as do our parents, day in, day out. Your witness is a living sign for all of us. And I see so many other examples too, of individuals living selflessly for the people around them, whether caring for their friends, neighbours or family, or for the dedication they put into their work. All of us are called to the same pure and simple love, but it will be lived out in a special way according to our circumstances. We will also all face our own challenges and struggles to live that call, but all of us can find strength in the Eucharist- the living sign of Christ's total self gift of love.

ALL SAINTS AND ALL SOULS

This week we celebrate two special days; All Saints and All Souls. All Saints commemorates all the souls who have fought the good fight and our now in heaven. There are simply too many to name individually, and perhaps some (for now at least) are known only to God. Perhaps you might have a few special people you have known who you count among the saints? Well, All Saints is there day too. We give thanks for the witness they gave, we rejoice that they have come to their reward, and we ask that they pray for us who are still in the fight. All Souls is a special invitation to pray for all those who have died and gone before us. You are invited to pray for the people you have known, but also for those who have no-one to pray for them. I sometimes wonder whether I need to pray for some individuals, as I feel surely they are in heaven already? Pray for them anyway- God will sort it out. And it is not like time as we know it is a reality after death- they are now in eternity, beyond the counting of days and weeks. Perhaps they are 'already' in heaven, and yet in the great mystery of God's love our prayers today have helped them along.

Eternal Rest Grant to Them O Lord, and Let Perpetual Light Shine Upon Them. May They Rest in Peace.

NEW TESTAMENT COMMENTARY BY MARY COLOE PBVM WHAT BELONGS TO GOD?

Before looking at the Lectionary reading it is helpful to place this passage in its Gospel context. In the Gospel last Sunday we read about the Herodians and Pharisees trying to trap Jesus with a trick question about taxes. The Gospel follow this incident with a further trick question this time asked by the Sadducees about the resurrection, since they do not believe in resurrection. Then today's Gospel returns to the Pharisees.

In these disputes we get a small glimpse into the type of disputes Jesus would have experienced with those in religious leadership. While others could claim some sort of credentials for their leadership roles — either the school where they were taught or their membership within a priestly tribe — Jesus had no such claims. He did not rely on learned credentials, or on a recognised position. And yet he gathered crowds to hear him and he spoke with the authority of his own personal experience of God and integrity. No wonder he was unpopular with the religious leaders of his time.

The Pharisees were a lay group within Israel. They were not priests and they sought to live a pattern of life devoted to the teaching of Moses. They were not necessarily legalists for they were open to reinterpretations of the written law and they tried to answer new questions that the written law had not spoken about e.g. resurrection. In many ways Jesus would have looked somewhat like a Pharisee in that he also was a lay person and was re-interpreting the Law of Moses. By the time Matthew is writing his Gospel the Temple in Jerusalem had been destroyed and so the Sadducees, the party of the priests, no longer had a significant role to play.

It was the Pharisees who were leading the people of Israel to a new way of living without the Temple. The early Christians would therefore have had most struggles with this group. Some of the conflicts between Jesus and the Pharisees we see in the Gospels most likely reflect the later conflicts between the early Church and he Rabbis after the destruction of Jerusalem — as both groups claim to be the true heirs to Israel.

The question the Pharisees put to Jesus lies at the very heart of the Torah – the Law. Jesus' response is the great prayer of Israel, the Shema. 'This then is the commandment... that the Lord your God has commanded, "Hear Oh Israel! The Lord your God, the Lord is One. And you shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart, and with your whole being, and with your whole strength."' (Deut 6:1, 4). Jesus ties to this the command from Leviticus, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself'. (Lev 19:18) Love of God and love of neighbour is the essence of the Law. If you recall last week I asked the question 'What belongs to God?' This week Jesus gives the answer – your whole heart, your whole soul, your whole mind. That's all!

I find the above paragraph quite overwhelming. God wants so much and there seems no room for compromise – your whole heart, whole soul, whole mind. I want to negotiate this a little. 'How about you have 90% and leave me with 10%? That sounds reasonable and very generous really.' But God's reply is unequivocal –'whole, 100%'. When I hear these words I am reminded of weddings I have attended and the marvel I feel as two people give themselves entirely to each other without reserve – sickness and health, richer or poorer, till death. This is 100%, whole heart, whole soul, whole mind. Love makes such total surrender both desirable and possible.

Perhaps this is what this Gospel is expressing. God desires us with such 100% love and wants us to respond to this love wholeheartedly. Again I consider that marriage offers the best image of such mutual self-giving and receiving. Part of the problem with God's love is that is seems so unbelievable. How could God possibly love me 100% when my life is so messy; parts of it I don't like so how can I expect God to like it? Surely God just likes the good bits, the successful bits, the public bits. But then I come back to the marriage commitment and the Gospel words. Love means the whole of me; richer or poorer, good times and bad; whole heart, whole soul, whole mind. @ Mary Coloe

A reading from the book of Exodus
If you are harsh with the widow or the orphan, my
anger will rage against you.

The Lord said to Moses, 'Tell the sons of Israel this, "You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. You must not be harsh with the widow, or with the orphan; if you are harsh with them, they will surely cry out to me, and be sure I shall hear their cry; my anger will flare and I shall kill you with the sword, your own wives will be widows, your own children orphans.

"If you lend money to any of my people, to any poor man among you, you must not play the usurer with him: you must not demand interest from him.

"If you take another's cloak as a pledge, you must give it back to him before sunset. It is all the covering he has; it is the cloak he wraps his body in; what else would he sleep in? If he cries to me, I will listen, for I am full of pity."

SECOND READING 1 Thessalonians 1:5-10

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians You turned away from idols to serve God and await his Son.

You observed the sort of life we lived when we were with you, which was for your instruction, and you were led to become imitators of us, and of the Lord; and it was with the joy of the Holy Spirit that you took to the gospel, in spite of the great opposition all round you. This has made you the great example to all believers in Macedonia and Achaia since it was from you that the word of the Lord started to spread

– and not only throughout Macedonia and Achaia, for the news of your faith in God has spread everywhere. We do not need to tell other people about it: other people tell us how we started the work among you, how you broke with idolatry when you were converted to God and became servants of the real, living God; and how you are now waiting for Jesus, his Son, whom he raised from the dead, to come from heaven to save us from the retribution which is coming.

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION John 14:23

Alleluia, alleluia! All who love me will keep my words, and my Father will love them and we will come to them. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Matthew 22:34-40

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew You shall love the Lord your God and your neighbour as yourself.

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees they got together and, to disconcert him, one of them put a question, 'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the law?' Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.' *The Gospel of the Lord*.
