CALL NO ONE ON EARTH YOUR FATHER,

SINCE YOU HAVE ONLY ONE FATHER, AND HE IS IN HEAVEN

So... am I going to stop calling my dad 'Dad'? No, because that is what he is. I owe him the gift of life (although let's be clear- as far as that goes he would be the first to admit mum had the much more important role!). But more than just being born, he played a crucial role in providing for and protecting me in my younger days. He also helped form me; teaching me respect and to put others first, challenging me to make the most of the gifts I had received, correcting me whenever I needed correction, and showing me by his example what hard work, perseverance, dedication and courage look like. For all of that I am deeply indebted (thanks Dad!), but on top of it there was also the gift of faith. There have been many lessons there, but perhaps the most central was the reality of God's Providential care for us. Even when our plans went astray, or we were confronted by our own limitations, we were always pointed as a family back to the strong Hand that held us, that of our loving Father in Heaven. And that was perhaps the most important lesson of all.

Now no earthly dad is perfect, and my dad is the first to admit his limitations. I know I am also lucky being number four, he had a bit of practice by the time I came around! Like every role of responsibility or authority, dad had to grow into his. And everytime we called out 'Dad', it called him to live up to the role God had given him. Titles can be powerful in that way, but only when understood in the proper context.

So back to the Gospel. Is Jesus dismissing the use of titles completely? I don't think so. He himself is called both 'Rabbi' and 'Teacher' by the crowds, and he doesn't refuse these titles. And while he doesn't call himself father, he identifies as one when by calling us his 'little children.' So the problem isn't so much with the titles themselves, it is with an improper understanding of them. We go wrong when we think the title is there for our own exaltation, or that we ourselves are the source of merit.

A rabbi is entrusted with the task of guiding and governing his community, but he is not its Master, because only God is truly Lord. As long as the rabbi recognises that God is the true authority, he does well. As soon as he seeks to lord it over his charges, he goes astray. And the same for fathers. God the Father entrusts them with the gift of life. As long as they draw from and point back to Him as the source of all life, they do well. But as soon as they think life is their own creation and seek to dominate and control, they go wrong. And finally for Teachers; they are tasked with sharing Light and leading others to the ultimate Truth. But the moment they confuse themselves with the light... they spread darkness instead.

All of us at one stage or another will bear a role of authority and responsibility. Sometimes that authority is stable and long lasting, like that carried by mothers and fathers. Sometimes it is related to our work or chosen vocation. But at other times it is more subtle, like the influence we can carry with our friends, or more fleeting, like when someone comes to us for help. Whatever the case, whenever we find ourselves in a position of authority, Christ calls us to never forget that God is the one truly in charge. If we have been entrusted with a task, we do it in cooperation with him. And that means exercising it just as he does; not for our sake but for the good of those we serve. ***"The greatest among you must be your servant. Anyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and anyone who humbles himself will be exalted."***

THE COMMUNION OF SAINTS

This past week we celebrated the great feast of All Saints and the special commemoration of All Souls. In the first we asked for the prayers of those souls already in heaven, and in the second we prayed for those who are still on the way as they are purified by God's love. Both commemorations are connected and not just because we remember the dead. All Saints and All Souls express something of our core belief- that as members of Christ's Body, we are intimately united together. Not even death can truly separate us. The souls who have died before us are still very much a part of the Church. Their earthly pilgrimage may be over, but that did not bring an end to their membership in Christ. They are alive in Christ, and the same Holy Spirit that stirs in our hearts continues to breathe life into their souls, until Christ raises us all body and soul at the final Resurrection. We are united together as members of Christ's body in a deeper way than we can ever imagine. But that intimate communion is not just with those Saints who have gone before us. It is also with each other now, and indeed with all the faithful around the world. Because we too are rightly called saints; we have been washed cleaned by baptism and have the life of Christ within us. Of course, we still have a lot of work to do, our job is far from complete, but still, the Holy Spirit is continually breathing his life and grace into us. That life is God's life, and God is All Holy, so in that sense we too are counted among the 'holy ones' or the 'saints', because his life moves within us. That is what St Paul meant when he wrote to the Corinthians, "To the church of God which is at Corinth, **to those sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours**" 1 Cor 1:2

That broader use of 'saints' is what is meant when we pray in the Creed 'I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, **the Communion of Saints...**' When we pray that we are confessing that we are all united together; joined together in a living communion that crosses both time and space, even the little distance of the gap in the pews! Neither distance, nor cultural differences, nor trivial disagreements nor even death can separate us. If we are united with Christ, we are in Communion with each other. Again, we still have a lot of work to do, but whatever our personal failings, the Communion is real. And it is real because the Holy Spirit makes it so. It is no accident that the 'Communion of Saints' comes right after the Holy Spirit. The Communion is His special ongoing work, and perhaps one of the clearest signs of His active presence in the world.

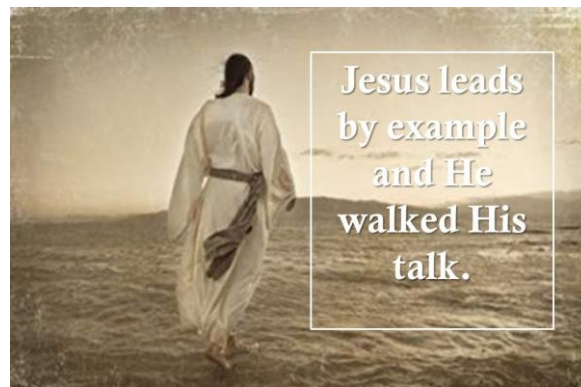
HAVE YOU THOUGHT?

Since Vatican II the responsibilities of leadership have been spread throughout the community. This has not happened simply because there are fewer priests and religious. It has occurred primarily because the Council itself insisted that by virtue of their baptism all Christians are called to discipleship, which includes active participation in the mission of the church. While those who are ordained continue in specialised forms of leadership, other people have stepped forward to assume their newly recognised responsibilities. Sometimes they have more influence in the church than do the ordained.

We derive the connection between pharisaical and hypocritical from Jesus' description of the Pharisees found in today's reading. His condemnation, along with the condemnation of the priests in the first reading, should be a warning to all who in any way exercise leadership. We must always be on our guard lest the trappings of leadership ensnare us and we fail in our responsibilities toward God and the community we serve.

There is a mode of leadership that reflects the very meaning of authority. This way of leadership authors life. It is characterised by the striking image of a nursing mother who both gives and sustains life. Those who exercise leadership in this way create a community where life is fostered, not stifled, where talents serve all of the members, and the talents of all of the members are invited to serve. Such a community not only nurtures its members, it is itself the author of life in the world. © Dianne Bergant
