# WE THE CLAY, YOU THE POTTER, WE ARE ALL THE WORK OF YOUR HAND.

The prophet Isaiah gets a good run during Advent. That is because he speaks so powerfully of hope in God's power to save. God will come to his people to save and comfort them, but they will need to be patient. A little history here may help; Isaiah is speaking to us from the last days of the kings of Judah. Soon God's little nation will be effectively wiped off the face of the earth and its people driven into exile. The world as they know it is falling apart. Many have given up on God, but a few like Isaiah are striving to keep faith. When he cries out, 'Oh, that you would tear the heavens open and come down...', he is not just trying to sound pious or holy, as if that is something God would like to hear him say. No, Isaiah is desperate. He is anxious for God's help, he wants it to come straight away... but he is not going to give up on God if he has to wait for it. Isaiah is ready to be patient- he is ready to hope even through the darkest of days. God holds his people securely in his hands. He is constantly working at their salvation, even if for the moment it may be difficult to understand exactly how. He is our loving Father, the patient potter, and we the precious clay being worked by his hands. At the beginning, clay can be stubborn and hard to mould. And so at times a potter has to work firmly, even roughly. It is a messy business, and yet also a very careful and patient task. Trying to rush things only leads to disaster. And it can be a mysterious business too- if you watch a potter, often you don't know what they are actually making until the very last minute. But the potter knows what they are working towards- the vision is clear in their mind, and they know just how they have to work the clay to get there. God is our patient potter. His firm but careful hand is working in our lives, even if when we struggle to understand how. Our hope informs us that he is bringing his good work to completion, according to his wisdom and love. Advent is the special time for us to renew that hope.

#### REVERSE ADVENT CALENDAR

The Reverse Advent Calendar Drive is back.

Boxes are available from the office and after Masses next weekend. You can participate by taking a box and filling it with suggested items (list available), donation of goods. Or if you don't have the time, you can also donate money which will be used to help fill the boxes with any missing items.

Unlike a regular Advent Calendar where the focus is on receiving a treat every day the Reverse Advent Calendar takes the focus off receiving and places the focus on giving to others.

A Reverse Advent Calendar begins as an empty box. Each day during December you place one item (non-perishable food, toiletries, Christmas treat food) into the box. Your filled Reverse Advent Calendar is returned to the parish office by **Sunday 19**<sup>th</sup> **Dec** ready for it to be distributed through A Good Kitchen and St Vincent de Paul.

Some of the suggested items for the box are canned fruit, canned vegetables, canned tuna, baked beans, soups, long life milk, juice, coffee, tea and milo, spreads such as vegemite, peanut butter or jam. Rice, pasta and noodles, cereal, muesli bars, toiletries, Christmas treat food. Regular everyday items.

#### BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL

Today we begin the season of Advent, which marks the start of a new liturgical year for the Church. The readings for Sunday Mass are arranged on a three-year cycle. Each year features a different Gospel—Matthew, Mark, or Luke. Readings from the Gospel of John are interspersed throughout all three years. With this year's first Sunday of Advent, we begin Cycle B of the Lectionary, which focuses our attention on the Gospel of Mark. This week and next week, our readings from Mark's Gospel present two important Advent themes: the Lord's return at the end of time and John the Baptist's preparation for Jesus.

Today's Gospel is taken from the end of Mark's Gospel, the chapter that immediately precedes Mark's account of Jesus' Passion. Having been questioned repeatedly by the scribes and the Pharisees, Jesus is now questioned by his disciples—Peter, James, John, and Andrew—who want details about his prediction of the destruction of the Temple. Jesus answers with many warnings about the difficulties that the disciples will face.

Today's passage comes at the conclusion of Jesus' warnings to his disciples. Jesus emphasizes the need for watchfulness. The Son of Man will come without warning; only the Father knows the exact hour. The disciples must not be caught unprepared when this time comes.

Scholars believe that Mark's Gospel was written around the time of the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in A.D. 70. Mark's audience consisted of Christians who were living in difficult social and political times, times of conflict. They were likely beginning to face persecution as followers of Jesus. In this difficult time, it helped to recall that Jesus had foretold of such difficulties. Early Christian communities took courage from Jesus' warning to remain alert and watchful, and they found in his words a way to persevere through suffering.

Today's Gospel reminds us that Advent is about more than our preparation for the Church's celebration of Christ's birth at Christmas. Advent is also about preparing ourselves for Christ's return in glory at the end of time. Like the disciples and the faithful in Mark's community, we must also stay alert and watchful. Our faithfulness to God, through the good times as well as the difficult times, shows us to be ready for the coming of the Son of Man.

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FIRST READING Isaiah 63:16-17; 64:1. 3-8 A reading from the prophet Isaiah Oh, that you would tear the heavens apart and come down.

You, Lord, yourself are our Father, Our Redeemer is your ancient name. Why, Lord, leave us to stray from your ways and harden our hearts against fearing you? Return, for the sake of your servants, the tribes of your inheritance.

Oh, that you would tear the heavens open and come down.

- at your Presence the mountains would melt. No ear has heard, no eye has seen, any god but you act like this, for those who trust him. You guide those who act with integrity, and keep your ways in mind. You were angry when we were sinners; we had long been rebels against you. We were all like men unclean, all that integrity of ours like filthy clothing. We have all withered like leaves, and our sins blew us away like the wind. No one invoked your name, or roused himself to catch hold of you. For you hid your face from us and gave us up to the power of our sins. And yet, Lord, you are our Father; we the clay, you the potter, we are all the work of your hand. The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

I thank him that you have been enriched in so many ways, especially in your teachers and preachers; the witness to Christ has indeed been strong among you so that you will not be without any of the gifts of the Spirit while you are waiting for our Lord Jesus Christ to be revealed; and he will keep you steady and without blame until the last day, the day of our Lord Jesus Christ, because God by calling you has joined you to his Son, Jesus Christ; and God is faithful. The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

#### **GOSPEL** Mark 13:33-37

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark Stay awake! You never know when the Lord will come.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Be on your guard, stay awake, because you never know when the time will come. It is like a man travelling abroad: he has gone from home, and left his servants in charge, each with his own task; and he has told the doorkeeper to stay awake. So stay awake, because you do not know when the master of the house is coming, evening, midnight, cockcrow, dawn; if he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep. And what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake!' The Gospel of the Lord.

ALL: Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.
