18[™] February 2024: First Sunday of Lent

'THE TIME HAS COME AND THE KINGDOM OF GOD IS CLOSE AT HAND.

REPENT, AND BELIEVE THE GOOD NEWS.'

So here we are, at the start of another Lent. And like every year, we begin with the story of Jesus' time of trial and temptation in the wilderness. Mark keeps the story short, using as few words as he can, but the basic points are there. After his Baptism, Jesus is 'driven' into the desert, where he 'remained for 40 days' (hence our 40 days of Lent), and was 'tempted by Satan', but the 'angels looked after him.'

Now that bit about being 'tempted by Satan' can sound a little awkward to our modern ear. We live in a very materialistic world, with a very materialistic world-view to go with it, so even as people of faith it can be difficult for us to acknowledge and talk about spiritual realities that are beyond our vision. Angels sound nice, even kinda cute, so we can sneak them into polite conversation every now and again, but demons... that just feels too much! Mention them and you risk being labelled a religious nut, or at least a bit cooky. And yet, the consistent witness of the Gospels is that angels and demons are real. Jesus isn't embarrassed to talk about them. They are part of our reality and are engaged in a spiritual battle that involves us as well. The Angels fight on our side, watching over us and giving us aid. Satan and his demons, not so much. The are doing their best to trick us and trip us up. They hate to see us living freely. They hate to see us living faithfully. They hate to see us thriving and living life to the full. In other words, they hate nothing more than seeing Jesus winning the battle in our lives.

Of course, there is a delicate balance here. We don't want to get too caught up in talk of angels and demons, because it can distract from our own agency. We have ultimate responsibility over our own lives and the choices we make. It isn't an accident that after he emerges from the desert, Jesus doesn't start trumpeting his Victory over the devil, but rather proclaims the choice that is set before us; repent (turn back to God), and believe the Good News. It really is a simple as that. The Ultimate Victory has been won. God's time is now. All we have to do is follow Christ day by day and eternal life is ours.

Christ is the ultimate focus. The freedom he has won for us the ultimate reality. But while we stumble along, it is also good to remember that we are engaged in a spiritual battle. There are powers that will try to deceive us and lead us astray, and we should be aware of this. But the greater reality is Christ and his power in us. He entered the battle on our behalf. He faced the trial and emerged the stronger. And that same freedom and strength is now made available to us. With Christ, we have nothing to fear.

REFLECTION BY NICK BRODIE

Discussing this Gospel, Pope Francis once said that 'Lent is a time of repentance, yes, but it is not a time of sorrow!'

The Pope wanted to remind Christians that Lent is a season of 'a joyous and serious commitment to strip ourselves of our selfishness ... and to renew ourselves according to the grace of our Baptism.' Note his emphasis on it being 'joyous.

In one of his major teaching documents, *Evangelli Gaudium*, the Pope begins as follows: 'The Joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus.' He goes on to say that 'With Christ joy is constantly born anew.' This is the kind of Lent we should all strive for: a joyful one.

Later in the same document the Pope expresses concern about joyless seriousness. 'There are Christians whose lives seem like Lent without Easter.'

The Pope then reminds us that 'Joy adapts and changes, but it always endures, even as a flicker of light born of our personal certainty that, when everything is said and done, we are infinitely loved.' Our Lent should be a time of joyful response to that love. Fasts and penances should be helping us find joy in Christ, not misery.

After all, Jesus emerged from the desert proclaiming 'Good News'. **© Nick Brodie**

FIRST READING Genesis 9:8-15

A reading from the book of Genesis

I will recall the covenant between myself and you... the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh.

God spoke to Noah and his sons, 'See, I establish my Covenant with you, and with your descendants after you; also with every living creature to be found with you, birds, cattle and every wild beast with you: everything that came out of the ark, everything that lives on the earth. I establish my Covenant with you: no thing of flesh shall be swept away again by the waters of the flood. There shall be no flood to destroy the earth again.'

God said, 'Here is the sign of the Covenant I make between myself and you and every living creature with you for all generations: I set my bow in the clouds and it shall be a sign of the Covenant between me and the earth. When I gather the clouds over the earth and the bow appears in the clouds, I will recall the Covenant between myself and you and every living creature of every kind. And so the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all things of flesh.'

A reading from the first letter of St Peter The water of the flood is a type of the baptism which saves you now.

Christ himself, innocent though he was, died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life, and, in the spirit, he went to preach to the spirits in prison. Now it was long ago, when Noah was still building that ark which saved only a small group of eight people 'by water', and when God was still waiting patiently, that these spirits refused to believe. That water is a type of the

baptism which saves you now, and which is not the washing off of physical dirt but a pledge made to God from a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has entered heaven and is at God's right hand, now that he has made the angels and Dominations and Powers his subjects. The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory! No one lives on bread alone,

but on every word that comes from the mouth of God. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory!

GOSPEL Mark 1:12-15

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark He was tempted by Satan, and the angels looked after him.

The Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness and he remained there for forty days, and was tempted by Satan. He was with the wild beasts, and the angels looked after him. After John had been arrested, Jesus went into Galilee. There he proclaimed the Good News from God. 'The time has come' he said 'and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News.'

The Gospel of the Lord. ALL: Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.
