



"FOLLOW ME, AND I WILL MAKE YOU INTO FISHERS OF MEN"

So here is Jesus, at the very beginning of his public ministry. After announcing the Good News that God's time has come and calling people to repentance (that is, a change of heart), what is the very first thing he does? He finds some fishermen, and calls them to join him in his Mission.

From the very get-go, Jesus begins to form a community around him. This new family is the beginnings of his Church. Communion and Mission belong together. When Jesus calls us to repentance and conversion, we are not just called to individual reform for its own sake. Repentance frees us to enter into relationship and communion; communion with God and communion with each other.

Last week we welcomed Simon and Channa, two of our seminarians who are in formation to serve as priests in our Diocese. Please pray for all our seminarians. They will have a special role in building up and serving the Church, the community Christ founded when he called his first disciples. But it was not only the apostles who brought people to Christ. All of his disciples helped win people to him, each in their own special way. And the same is true for us. It is not only bishops and priests, religious and missionaries who are called to be 'fishers of people.' Each and every one of us is called through our baptism to share Christ with the people around us, and so help bring them into relationship with him. That is how the Church grows; we Christ's followers invite others to join us on the way. We don't have to have all the answers, just a simple trust in the one we follow.

NEW TESTAMENT COMMENTARY BY MARY COLOE PBVM

COME AND JOIN ME
Mark 1:14-20

Follow me and I will make you fishers of people. Today we hear the call of the first disciples from Mark's Gospel, which is quite different to how we heard it last Sunday in John's Gospel — a further reminder that the Gospels are theological reflections on the meaning of Jesus' life, rather than biographies or histories.

It is false to imagine these disciples as poor, simple, lower-class men and women. As this Gospel shows, four of them are involved in a major industry in Israel – fishing. Fish was a staple part of the diet in a land unable to sustain large flocks of sheep or herds of cattle. James and John are part of their father's industry that is profitable enough to hire others. In our terms these disciples would be middle-class. Their leaving all behind is therefore quite costly.

Mark's Gospel emphasises discipleship. He writes for his own community struggling to be faithful in a time of persecution and fear. In this scene we see what discipleship costs, namely to be prepared to leave your livelihood and your family. This was a reality within the early church when becoming a follower of Jesus meant leaving the religious traditions and social network of your family's Jewish faith. Once this step was made the past was closed to you. Discipleship costs for the followers of Jesus, as it does for disciples of all time.

Our struggles are different but true discipleship still costs. For some it may be integrity in the work place; bearing the ridicule of others for a particular ethical or religious stance, even within the family. Hear in these difficult moments Jesus' call to be his companion.

The focus of Jesus' preaching is that the reign of God is at hand and this is Good News. Throughout the Old Testament the people of Israel had great faith in God's promises even through long periods of loss and Exile. Just before the time of Jesus, the people experienced a long period of oppression from a Greek Empire and then the Roman Empire. During these final centuries a new type of hope emerged. This hope understood the world as a place dominated by the powers of Evil, what they called the reign of Satan. God's reign would only come when God was able to overcome the power of Evil and establish a reign of peace and justice on earth. This is the hope that lies behind Jesus' proclamation of the Kingdom. God has entered into the definitive final struggle against the powers of Satan and God's own reign is already beginning. The many exorcisms and miracles in Mark are the signs of God's victory over Satan. This is truly good news.

The word 'Repent' really means a 'change of heart'. For people who have adjusted to living within the values of this world under the dominion of Evil, then to live within the values of God's rein will require a change of heart. It is simply not possible to live within two different world-views and their opposing values. Jesus announces the reign of God and invites hearers to the change of heart necessary to embrace God's desires. This is invitation and the disciples are the first we see who respond. The dramatic leaving behind of boats and families symbolises the totality of the shift required to change one's heart.

As a New Year begins many people take time to reflect on their manner of living and to make resolutions to change aspects of their life. While making resolutions for the New Year can be trivialised, the custom does reflect what the Gospel is describing — make a change in your life. If you desire the path of God, then reconfigure the roadmap of your life.

A reading from the prophet Jonah
The Ninevites renounced their evil ways.

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah: 'Up!' he said 'Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to.' Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, 'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.' And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least.

God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.

The Word of the Lord. **ALL**: Thanks be to God.

Those who have wives should live as though they had none, and those who mourn should live as though they had nothing to mourn for; those who are enjoying life should live as though there were nothing to laugh about; those whose life is buying things should live as though they had nothing of their own; and those who have to deal with the world should not become engrossed in it.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark Repent, and believe the Good News.


