

28th January 2024: 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"The people were so Astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant."



As quickly as Jesus begins his public ministry, the people begin to ask themselves 'who is this man?', 'what can this all mean?'. He is a teacher, yes, but more than a teacher; he speaks with an authority none other has yet claimed. He is a healer, yes, but more than a healer; no sickness, hurt or evil spirit can resist him. He is a prophet, yes, but more than a prophet. A prophet speaks for God and acts in his name. God is clearly with Jesus, and yet his name has its own authority and power as well. What can this all mean?

As we listen to the Gospels over the next few weeks, we follow Jesus from the beginning of his ministry all the way to its fulfilment in Jerusalem. As we follow him, we hear his words and see his works. What we see and hear should prompt that same question on our own lips; 'Who is this man?'; 'What can this all mean?'. That question is not merely an intellectual one; remaining on the level of knowledge. Even the unclean spirit is able to name Jesus for who he truly is. Rather, the question is on the level of faith and calls for our heartfelt response. If he is the Holy One of God, how does that change things? What response does that call for in my life? Could I grow to know him more nearly? Follow his words more closely? Trust him more deeply?

We spend our whole lives growing in each of those ways; relationships are inexhaustible. That's why the question is continually posed to us anew. 'What can this all mean?' The point is not to rush to the perfect answer, but to wrestle with the question so that we might continue to grow in love.



NEW TESTAMENT COMMENTARY BY MARY COLOE PBVM THE POWER OF EVIL HAS BEEN DESTROYED. 1 Corinthians 7:32-35; Mark 1:21-28

'Here is a teaching that is new.'

Archaeologists have done major excavations at Capernaum and visitors today see a large white Synagogue built upon the foundations of an earlier first century Synagogue. Capernaum was an important city situated on Lake Galilee and was the centre of Jesus' ministry more than his home town Nazareth which was a smaller inland village. What surprises people about Jesus is his manner of teaching. The normal pattern of teaching in those days would have been to quote the teaching of a former great rabbi — 'According to Rabbi Hillel . . .' or, 'As Rabbi Nathan said . . .'. But Jesus teaches from his own experience and knowledge of God. This gives his words an astounding authority — no wonder his reputation spread.

The episode in today's Gospel is the first miracle in Mark, and it is an exorcism where Jesus defeats the powers of evil. Mark is operating within a common understanding of the Jews of his time that this world is under the power of Satan. The Jews looked to God to put an end to this world and to usher in a new world of God's desires and God's authority.

In the Gospel this new world is called God's Kingdom. But before this new world can begin, the evil powers that currently are in control must first be overcome. It is not surprising then, that immediately after his Baptism Jesus goes into the wilderness to confront Satan and then publicly shows that Satan has been defeated in this first public miracle.

Notice that I use the past tense — Satan has been defeated. This may be hard to believe given the terrorist attacks and wars of recent years, but Christian faith proclaims that the the gracious love of God is now present in this world; God's Kingdom is in process. The Gospel will go on to speak of God's reign with images of seeds and yeast, in go other words, small things that have life energy and can grow. Such small things may not make the news headlines and can be overlooked. This week, look around you. Look for the seeds; look for the signs of God already present in your life.

The letter to the Corinthians continues Paul's advice from last week. Again this is part of a long response to questions the Corinthians put to Paul. We only have the answers so we can only guess what they may have written 'Dear Paul, we know that Jesus will soon return to us but we have been waiting now a few years. Some of us are wondering whether we should marry or not. If Jesus is coming soon perhaps there is no point in marrying, but what do you advise?'

Paul advises his community not to marry, but if his words are taken out of context they can be misinterpreted as suggesting he is against marriage. This is not the case. Within Judaism marriage and children are a great blessing and it would be very odd for Paul to advise against marrying - except that he is anticipating the return of Jesus very soon. His main concern is 'that you give your undivided attention to the Lord'. Notice that Paul offers the same advice to both men and women: 'an unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs . . . in the same way, an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs.' In this letter and in Paul's letter to the Romans we see quite clearly that women, as well as men, had significant roles within the Pauline Churches. Paul commends the woman deacon Phoebe and calls her a leader of the nearby port city of Cenchrea, a few kilometres from Corinth (Rom 16:1-2). The presence of the Risen Christ makes all other things, even marriage, relative.

FIRST READING Deuteronomy 18:15-20

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy
I will put my words into the prophet's mouth, and he will tell them all I command.

Moses said to the people: 'Your God will raise up for you a prophet like myself, from among yourselves, from your own brothers; to him you must listen. This is what you yourselves asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the Assembly. "Do not let me hear again" you said "the voice of the Lord my God, nor look any longer on this great fire, or I shall die"; and the Lord said to me, "All they have spoken is well said. I will raise up a prophet like yourself for them from their own brothers; I will put my words into his mouth and he shall tell them all I command him. The man who does not listen to my words that he speaks in my name, shall be held answerable to me for it. But the prophet who presumes to say in my name a thing I have not commanded him to say, or who speaks in the name of other gods, that prophet shall die."'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM Ps 94:1-2. 6-9. R. v.9 (R.) If today, you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 7:32-35

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians The unmarried woman dedicates herself to the things of the Lord, that she might be holy.

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to

make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL Mark 1:21-28


A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark This is a new kind of teaching that speaks with authority.

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority. In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside. The Gospel of the Lord.
