24th March 2024 PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

HE WAS HUMBLER YET, EVEN TO ACCEPTING DEATH, DEATH ON A CROSS.



Something struck me the other day during a funeral. As you may know, most families now like to have a slide-show of precious photos as part of the ceremony. Often these will include snaps taken during significant family events- including Weddings, Baptisms & Confirmations. If the family have lived in the area for a few generations, many of those occasions have taken place in the very same building in which we are celebrating the funeral. The parish church has been like a second home, the privileged setting for so many memories.

Okay, so that thought is nothing new. But what struck me at the funeral was this- as the slide show switched to a picture of just such a family wedding, taken at the front of our Church, my eyes drifted across to the Crucifix above the altar. That same Crucifix has been a constant for that family- it was there for all their precious events in the church. And the same is true for so many families I know (including my own), and so many other churches.

And that Crucifix has been there, not just for the big celebrations of life, but for every person who has come with their prayers; their worries and trials, their hopes and their joys. For each and every person who has entered our church, those arms have extended in welcome and embrace. For each and every one, they have been raised as a shield to protect. When faced with periods of suffering in our life, those wounded hands have reminded us that we are not alone. And even if we have lost hope, or for a time have drifted away, those arms have never, never stopped reaching out for us.

It is a powerful symbol isn't it?

Of course, the Crucifix itself is something man-made. But what it represents is something far beyond our imagination, far beyond our hopes; it represents the Son who reaches out to embrace us and his awesome act of unconditional Love. It is the sign on which we can pin our hopes and rest our lives. Just as the same Crucifix watches over us, the Son never ceases to watch over us with undying love. He will never forget or abandon us, even if we forget or abandon him. As we hear the story of His Passion again today, may we hear it not just as a tale from the past, but as reality in our lives today.

HOLY LAND COLLECTION GOOD FRIDAY, MARCH 29, 2024

The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land will take place on Good Friday. For 800 years, the Franciscan Friars have shared the difficult lives of Christians in the countries that make up the Franciscan Custody of the Holy Land: Israel and Palestine, Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, Rhodes and Cyprus. The people of these countries face their own difficulties, but particularly Christians due to their minority status. Among them, the friars have never ceased offering their pastoral care. Two years ago it was the pandemic that was causing havoc for the people in the Holy Land (as it was in the rest of the world), but now there is a new and more dangerous threat through the ongoing conflict which may last for quite some time. Just when pilgrims were starting to return, the Sacred Places of our Christian Faith are once again closed to pilgrims. Pilgrims are vital because they generate income that allows the Friars and the local Church to fulfil their mission of caring for the Holy Places (which also give work to the local people), as well as running parishes, schools & caring for orphans, refugees, the homeless, & more.

DIVINE MERCY- APRIL 7TH

The Second (or Low) Sunday of Easter is also the Feast of Divine Mercy. This is a special celebration of our Lord's unending and inexhaustible Mercy. To mark this great feast, we will once again hold a Holy Hour in Swan Hill on Sunday 7th, starting at 2pm and finishing with the Divine Mercy Chaplet at 3pm. Confessions will be available during the time of Adoration.



Each morning he wakes me to hear, to listen like a disciple.

The Lord has opened my ear.

For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away.

I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard;

I did not cover my face against insult and spittle.

The Lord comes to my help,

so that I am untouched by the insults.

So, too, I set my face like flint;

I know I shall not be shamed.

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM Ps 21:8-9. 17-20. 23-24. R. v.2 (R.) My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?

All who see me deride me.

They curl their lips, they toss their heads. 'He trusted in the Lord, let him save him; let him release him if this is his friend.'

Many dogs have surrounded me, a band of the wicked beset me. They tear holes in my hands and my feet. I can count every one of my bones.

They divide my clothing among them. They cast lots for my robe. O Lord, do not leave me alone, my strength, make haste to help me!

I will tell of your name to my brethren and praise you where they are assembled. 'You who fear the Lord give him praise; all sons of Jacob, give him glory. Revere him, Israel's sons.' (R.)

SECOND READING Philippians 2:6-11

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians He humbled himself to become like us and God raised him on high.

His state was divine, yet Christ Jesus did not cling

to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are, and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father. The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION Philippians 2:8-9

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory! Christ became obedient for us even to death dving on the cross.

Therefore God raised him on high and gave him a name above all other names.
