JESUS SAID TO HIM, 'EPHPHATHA,' THAT IS, 'BE OPENED.'

I love today's Gospel. I must admit though- I'm not 100% sure if I am getting the pronunciation right on 'Ephphatha'- I will just have to do the best I can. Which is a bit of a pity- because it is one of those rare occasions in the Gospels when we hear the actual Aramaic word that comes directly from Jesus' lips. For the most part, we are getting a translation into Greek, and then into English. But here the very word 'Ephphatha' must have impressed itself so deeply on the disciples' hearts, that they didn't just hand down a translation, but the actual word Jesus spoke. And so, it now comes down directly to us. *Ephphatha! Be opened!*

Now these same words are echoed in the Baptism Rite. Just after the newly baptised receives the Light of Christ, the priest completes the celebration with a blessing over the ears and the lips. Recalling the story we heard today, the priest says; "Ephphetha! The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the dumb speak.

May he soon touch your ears to receive his word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father." Through baptism, the Lord opens our ears, so that we may understand his word, and treasure it in our hearts. But he doesn't stop with just our ears; he also loosens our tongue to proclaim his faith. Our lips have been blessed and our tongue set free so that we may give thanks with loud voices, proclaiming the wonders God has done and sharing our love for him. We are also sent out to share his word with the people around us. We are commissioned to speak his words of love to all who long to hear them.

Our lips are no longer our own; they belong to the Lord.

Perhaps this is a good moment to reflect on how we use our words. When people hear us speak; do our words bring them closer to God, or do they drive them away? Do our words lead them to the source of our strength and our hope, or do we seldom speak of our faith and what it means to us, and so they left none the wiser? And finally, do our words build up the people around us, or do they tear them down? The Lord didn't loosen our lips for gossip or nasty talk. He loosened them to speak truth and love. Is that obvious to the people around us? Is that what they hear in our speech?

There are lots of other things I love about the passage, but just one more thing for now. After the man is healed, Jesus asks the witnesses to keep quiet about the whole thing. And how did that turn out? "The more he insisted, the more widely they published it." In other words, he couldn't shut them up! May people say the same about us! Let's never shut up about all the wonders the Lord has done for us!

HAVE YOU THOUGHT?

Why did Jesus take the man aside in private rather than healing him in front of the crowd?

What is significant about Jesus touching the man in such a personal way?

Why did Jesus travel and perform miracles outside of Jewish territories?

In what areas of life do you need to 'be opened'?

How can you cross the boundaries and make a difference in someone else's life like Jesus did?

BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING

Today we continue to hear the Gospel of Mark proclaimed. In today's reading, Jesus heals a man who was deaf and had a speech impediment. This is a story about Jesus' healing power, and in it we find clues about our understanding of sacrament. We are struck by the physical means used to heal the man, the use of spittle and touch. The Church continues to celebrate the sacraments using physical means. In the Sacrament of Baptism, water and oil are used to show the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, we are anointed with holy oil on the forehead and the hands. In the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ.

We are a sacramental people who believe that God's grace is given to us through these physical signs.

Some, however, see in this Gospel an image of the proclamation of the good news of Jesus to the Gentiles. The geographic references tell us that Jesus is journeying through Gentile territory. Jesus had previously visited this region and healed a person possessed by a demon. Jesus was already famous there, which explains why people brought the deaf man to him. The story that precedes this reading in Mark's Gospel sets the stage. Jesus encounters a Gentile, a Syrophoenician woman who asks him to heal her demon-possessed daughter. Jesus engages her in a dialogue about not feeding to dogs the food intended for children. Jesus is struck by the woman's great faith when she replies that even dogs eat the food that falls from the table, and he heals her daughter immediately. The faith of this Greek woman compels Jesus to respond to her plea.

Mark shows that Jesus' own mission affirms the early Church's mission to the Gentiles. This was a significant issue to the early Christian community, which found that the good news of Jesus took root and spread quickly among the Gentiles. Yet there is an irony in the story of healing that Mark tells. Jesus gives the man the gift of speech, but then tells him not to use it. Jesus asks that the news of his healing power, which is evidence of his identity as the Messiah, not be spread. This is a recurring motif in Mark's Gospel and is sometimes called the "messianic secret." © Loyola Press

LIVING THE GOSPEL - OPEN TO COMPASSION

When Isaiah described the signs by which the Messiah would be recognised, he identified those people who were isolated from society by their physical afflictions. He portrayed a Messiah who released them from those afflictions and allowed them to re-enter society. That is what Jesus did time and time again. In the healing of the deaf and dumb man, Jesus called on all those around him to also be opened — that their hearts may be opened to compassion. Jesus calls to us through today's gospel to also be open to compassion and open to the needs of those around us.



FIRST READING Isaiah 35:4-7

A reading from the prophet Isaiah Then the ears of the deaf shall be opened and the tongues of the dumb speak.

Say to all faint hearts,
'Courage! Do not be afraid.
'Look, your God is coming,
vengeance is coming,
the retribution of God;
he is coming to save you.'
Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened,
the ears of the deaf unsealed,
then the lame shall leap like a deer
and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy;
for water gushes in the desert,
streams in the wasteland,
the scorched earth becomes a lake,
the parched land springs of water.

SECOND READING James 2:1-5

A reading from the letter of St James Has not God chosen the poor of the world to inherit the kingdom?

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my

foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION cf Matthew 4:23

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus preached the Good News of the kingdom and healed all who were sick. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Mark 7:31-37

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark He makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

The Gospel of the Lord.

ALL: Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.
