'RABBUNI,' THE BLIND MAN SAID TO HIM 'MASTER, LET ME SEE AGAIN.'



We hear that the blind man Bartimaues had been begging; pleading for alms so that he could at least eat and so survive. Of course, he had to keep doing this every day. The people who helped him could only address the symptom, his hunger, not the underlying cause; the deep wound of his blindness. Then suddenly everything changes. He hears that Jesus is passing by, and so he jumps at the chance to beg of Jesus' help too. But this time it is different. Jesus can heal his wound of blindness. Jesus, and only Jesus, can help him see again.

We all face challenges and hurts in the brokenness of this life. We might struggle with a particular bad habit or pattern of behaviour, or maybe there is ongoing tensions and conflict in our relationships that are most dear to us. Too often, we

focus only on the problem that is presented to us, and our prayer may also limit itself to just that; pleading to God to simply 'fix the problem'. And perhaps for a time this prayer works. The symptoms are eased, and we enjoy a period of peace and wholeness. But soon we find the symptoms return. It is only when our prayer and

focus can shift to the underlying wound at the root of it all that deep and lasting healing can begin.

It is a bit like Bartimaeus begging for bread; his hunger is abated for a time, but the wound at the root of it all still remains. Soon, he will be hungry again. He is only truly whole again after he boldly turns to Christ to heal his deeper wound of blindness. May we also have the courage and faith to open up our hearts to Christ and boldly call on him to heal our deeper wounds so that we may be truly whole.

ALL SAINTS & ALL SOULS: Remembering the Departed and our Hope in Heaven

This week we celebrate the great feasts of All Saints and All Souls, a special time to remember those who have gone before us and our great hope that they are alive in Christ. Christ defeated Death on the Cross, and by Rising opened up for us the gates of Heaven. Death may draw its veil between us, but we believe that in Christ we still share in Communion with all the faithful departed; for all are alive in Christ.

Our celebrations begin with the 6pm Vigil of All Saints on Thursday 31st October (Halloween), followed by the Family Event. Friday's 11:30am Mass will also be for All Saints (aka All Hallows), and then the 10am Mass on Saturday 2nd offered for All Souls. Saturday evening's Mass will be of the 31st Sunday, but as it still falls on the 2nd the opportunity for obtaining an indulgence for visiting a Church still stands.

NEW TESTAMENT COMMENTARY BY MARY COLOE PBVM

A MODEL DISCIPLE Mark 10:46-52

Immediately his sight returned, and he followed Jesus along the way.

This episode concludes a very significant section of Mark's Gospel, which began with Jesus healing a blind man in Bethsaida (8:22-26) in Galilee, then setting out on a journey south to Jerusalem along the Jordan valley. In this journey, Jericho is the last stop before Jerusalem, and it is here that he meets another blind man. In between these two miracles where blind people gain sight, Jesus has been trying to lead his disciples to an understanding of his mission. He has taught them three times about what awaits him in Jerusalem, and each time the disciples fail to perceive his meaning. He has taught them about letting go the desire for wealth, power and prestige and to seek the gift that only God can give, namely life in God's presence. But the disciples have argued about who will be the greatest and who will have positions of authority.

Now, in today's reading, blind Bartimaeus models what discipleship entails. In his poverty he calls out to Jesus knowing that only Jesus can give him what he truly desires. When he is healed, he leaves behind all he has and becomes a follower of Jesus on the way that will lead to the cross.

The Gospel describes Bartimaeus as sitting by 'the way', and at the end of the story he follows Jesus 'on the way'. This term, 'the Way', appears to be one of the earliest names for the Church – 'followers of the Way' (see Acts 9:2; 19:9, 23; 24:14, 22). When Mark uses this term, on a number of occasions it is more than simply a description of a path, but has the theological sense of 'the way of discipleship'. Where the disciples are blinded by their ambitions, Bartimaeus sees clearly and he willingly leaves his things behind, throws off his cloak and takes up the position of a disciple – a follower on the way. This episode is far more than a simple healing miracle; it is really a lesson in discipleship and it makes a sharp contrast with the ignorance and ambition shown by Jesus' disciples throughout his journey.

Bartimaeus is able to name his deepest need and seek the one who can fulfil this. Can I leave aside the external trapping that can distract me from following my heart's desire?



FIRST READING Jeremiah 31:7-9 A reading from the prophet Jeremiah I shall lead them back in mercy – both the blind and the lame.

The Lord says this: Shout with joy for Jacob! Hail the chief of nations! Proclaim! Praise! Shout: The Lord has saved his people, the remnant of Israel! See, I will bring them back from the land of the North and gather them from the far ends of earth; all of them: the blind and the lame, women with child, women in labour: a great company returning here. They had left in tears, I will comfort them as I lead them back; I will guide them to streams of water, by a smooth path where they will not stumble. For I am a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my first-born son. The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PS 125. R. v.3 (R.) The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy.

When the Lord delivered Zion from bondage, It seemed like a dream. Then was our mouth filled with laughter, on our lips there were songs.

The heathens themselves said: 'What marvels the Lord worked for them!' What marvels the Lord worked for us! Indeed we were glad.

Deliver us, O Lord, from our bondage as streams in dry land. Those who are sowing in tears will sing when they reap.

They go out, they go out, full of tears, carrying seed for the sowing: they come back, they come back, full of song, carrying their sheaves. **(R.)**

SECOND READING Hebrews 5:1-6 A reading from the letter to the Hebrews You are a priest forever in the line of Melchizedek.

Every high priest has been taken out of mankind and is appointed to act for men in their relations with God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins; and so he can sympathise with those who are ignorant or uncertain because he too lives in the limitations of weakness. That is why he has to make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honour on himself, but each one is called by God, as Aaron was. Nor did Christ give himself the glory of becoming high priest, but he had it from the one who said to him: You are my son, today I have become your father, and in another text: You are a priest of the order of Melchizedek, and for ever.

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION See 2 Timothy 1:10


Alleluia, alleluia! Our Saviour Jesus Christ has done away with death, and brought us life through his gospel. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Mark 10:46-52

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark Master, grant that I may see.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind" man' 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

The Gospel of the Lord. ALL: Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.
