# TAKE THE PLANK OUT OF YOUR OWN EYE FIRST, AND THEN YOU WILL SEE CLEARLY ENOUGH TO TAKE OUT THE SPLINTER THAT IS IN YOUR BROTHER'S EYE.

When it comes to preaching, I keep things pretty general and don't give too many specific examples or overly prescriptive advice. This is firstly because everyone's situation in life is so different; what might be a good idea for one person might be unhelpful for another. For example, what a good daily prayer routine might look like for a elderly person living on their own will be very different to that of a young mother with little children to care for. The different responsibilities and struggles we face through the seasons of our life, the different settings we find ourselves in, even the difference in our own personal temperaments, all call for a unique application of the Gospel message. And no matter how wise and holy I may become, I will never be able to apply the message for each and every person all at once.

But of course, there is also the reality that I am not yet particularly wise or holy. And that is the second reason I am never overly prescriptive; I am conscious that there are still blind spots in my life, planks you could say, that I need work on removing. Okay, I have been entrusted with a task, and need to do my best with it, but I don't want to present myself as a guru with all the answers, because I am far from it. But even a semi blind man can know pretty quickly if his guide is trustworthy. We can know clearly enough that Jesus is our true guide, and that we can trust him. His sight is perfectly clear, and only goodness flows from his heart. So we can confidently place our hand in his, and ask him to help clear our sight. That is a good image of what is happening every time we hear his word in the Gospel; Jesus is clearing our blind spots and helping us to see more clearly. And so we should never be afraid to point others to him as well. Sure, we need to remain humble, and be careful of rushing to judgement, remaining conscious of our blind spots... but humility never prevents us from confidently pointing to our healer and guide. In fact, if anything, it is the most humble thing we can do. Go to Jesus! He will guide you!



#### ASH WEDNESDAY

This week sees the beginning of Lent with Ash Wednesday. This is a special day of prayer, abstinence (no meat, although little children are exempted from this too) and fasting (for those who can handle it- so just for adults and not if it is unhealthy or too burdensome for you to do so- eg. if you are sick, pregnant, frail or elderly). And what does fasting look like? The suggestion is we skip a meal, or its equivalent (so we might cut a bit out of each meal during the day). But again, what each of us is capable of according to our fitness and the labour we need to undertake should guide what this looks like. And of course, there is also the opportunity to come to Mass and receive the Ashes as a special sign of the start of our Lenten journey. Masses in Swan Hill will be at 10:30am and 6pm, and there will also be a liturgy with the Sea Lake school at 2pm. I will also bring ashes to Quambatook and Nandaly next Sunday as per our usual custom.

#### HAVE YOU THOUGHT?

What lesson/s do you take from this passage?

What is the danger of treating all opinions as equal?

In what way is treating all opinions as equal different from showing respect for a person's opinion?

What does it mean to 'take the log out of your own eye'?

What strategies do you use to 'filter' or evaluate critical comments before you make them?

How do you recognise a person who produces good 'out of the good treasure of the heart'?

How do you seek to nurture the good treasure of your heart?

#### GOSPEL FOCUS - GOOD FROM GOOD

'The good person out of the good treasure of the heart produces good.' What makes a person good? Is it that they have had good things happen in their life? There are plenty of people who have had good things in their life but they remain cynical and spiteful people. Similarly there are plenty who have had the hardest of circumstances yet goodness constantly flows from them. It's not the external influences but what we do with them that determines whether we are nurturing 'good treasure' or harbouring 'evil treasure'. This is not just sugary sweetness but a deliberate decision to be a person of hope.

# SCRIPTURAL CONTEXT – THREE TEXTS; ONE LESSON

Today's gospel is made up of three separate teachings of Jesus that have been put together by the gospel writer to convey a particular message. When taken together, the three teachings all shed light on the way believers influence one another in community. It is a call to witness to one another through actions as well as words. Before we seek to teach another we must ensure we have adequately learned the lesson ourselves. We must be self-appraising before we critique another. Finally, our actions towards one another are a reflection of our intentions; good actions come from goodness of the heart.

#### LIVING THE GOSPEL - YOU HYPOCRITE

It is often argued that it is hypocrisy to attend Mass on Sundays and be 'holy' in that circumstance but to then be less than perfect during the rest of the week. This is often rolled out as a convenient excuse for not attending Mass at all: everyone who goes to Mass is a hypocrite. Of course, attending Mass does not imply perfection. It is in fact a recognition of imperfection and the need to come together as a community and to seek God's help to have another go at trying to get it a bit more right in the coming week.



#### FIRST READING Sirach 27:4-7

A reading from the book of Ecclesiasticus Do not praise someone before they have spoken.

In a shaken sieve the rubbish is left behind, so too the defects of a man appear in his talk. The kiln tests the work of the potter, the test of a man is in his conversation. The orchard where the tree grows is judged on the quality of its fruit, similarly a man's words betray what he feels. Do not praise a man before he has spoken, since this is the test of men.

# **RESPONSORIAL PSALM** Ps 91:2-3, 13-16, R. See v.2 (R.) Lord, it is good to give thanks to you.

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

It is good to give thanks to the Lord to make music to your name, O Most High, to proclaim your love in the morning and your truth in the watches of the night.

The just will flourish like the palm-tree and grow like a Lebanon cedar.

Planted in the house of the Lord they will flourish in the courts of our God, still bearing fruit when they are old, still full of sap, still green, to proclaim that the Lord is just. In him, my rock, there is no wrong. (R.)

#### **SECOND READING** 1 Corinthians 15:54-58

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians Victory has been given to us through Jesus Christ.

When this perishable nature has put on imperishability, and when this mortal nature has put on immortality, then the words of scripture will come true: Death is swallowed up in victory. Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting? Now the sting of death is sin, and sin gets its power from the Law. So let us thank God for giving us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Never give in then, my dear brothers, never admit defeat; keep on working at the Lord's work always, knowing that, in the Lord, you cannot be labouring in vain.

The Word of the Lord. ALL: Thanks be to God.

#### **GOSPEL ACCLAMATION** Philippians 2:15-16

Alleluia, alleluia! Shine on the world like bright stars; you are offering it the word of life. Alleluia!

#### **GOSPEL** Luke 6:39-45

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke A person speaks from what is in his heart.

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'

The Gospel of the Lord. ALL: Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.
